Re: **Administrative Report for the Week Ending September 29, 2017**

ADMINISTRATION

1. Staff met with MMSD re: Resilience project
2. Staff participated in Public Policy Forum Viewpoint luncheon
3. Monday, October 2, 2017 Plan Commission agenda and packet was prepared, generated, posted and delivered by staff for the 5:45 p.m. NEW meeting time.
4. Wednesday, October 4, 2017 5:00 p.m. Special Village Board meeting agenda was prepared, generated, posted and delivered by staff.
5. Wednesday, October 4, 2017 Board of Review 5:30 p.m. meeting agenda and packet was prepared, generated, posted and delivered by staff.
6. Board of Review submitted objections hearings were scheduled, prepared, delivered, mailed and/or e-mailed.
7. The Fox Point Ward Map was added to the village website by staff.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. Work predominantly is focused on the Navajo/Seneca project. All of the water service laterals on Seneca have been installed and a subcontractor (Van Stratten) is completing the laterals on Navajo. Michels is working on the water main loop from Crossway to Seneca and a separate crew has begun re-grading the ditches along Seneca. Michels is still forecasting a completion date in mid to late October. Our crews are completing the remaining end wall work along the project route.
2. Jet Underground finished the water main work and now has restoration and road patching activities to complete. They are expected to be completed with their work in the next month.
3. We Energies is still working on gas main work on the north end of the Village (Cherokee, Mohawk, Navajo area) and is expected to be done in a few weeks.
4. DPW crews have been watering the 2017 tree plantings, performing street patches around manholes, performed rain garden maintenance at the PD, and getting barricades ready for Yom Kippur and the Lakefront Marathon.
5. One leaf vacuum is ready to go and leaf collection activities will begin next Monday.
6. Staff met with property owner and attorney regarding resolution of a storm sewer location and easement.

7. Corresponded with MMSD regarding the Indian Creek project and tentatively set an additional meeting date to discuss the various options.
8. Met with MMSD regarding their proposed resiliency plan and provided input on potential risks.
9. Reviewed and commented on grading and drainage plans.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

1. On September 22, 2017 at 1:56 am, officer responded to the 8000 block of North Regent Road for a report of a motor vehicle theft. Officers arrived and met with the resident who reported that their car was taken from the driveway by an unknown person within the last 10 minutes. The vehicle had been unlocked and the keys left in the vehicle. The vehicle was recovered approximately 12 hours later utilizing a GPS tracking device and the car was processed by officers for evidence. The case remains open and officers are interviewing possible suspects.
2. On September 22, 2107 at 6:37 am, officers responded to the 7300 block of North Iroquois Road for a report of a burglary. Officers met with the resident who informed them that an unknown person had entered the house through a window overnight and stole money and personal electronics. In addition, the person stole the keys to the cars and removed three vehicles from the driveway. The officers were able to locate 2 of the cars within the hour through the use of GPS tracking. The third car was recovered later in the day in the City of Milwaukee. The investigation remains open.
3. On September 22, 2017 at 12:08 pm, officers responded to Best Buy, 8755 North Port Washington Road, for a report of a retail theft. The officers were advised that a male subject was in the store and had concealed merchandise within his clothing. The officers contacted the subject as he exited the store and confirmed he had concealed merchandise. The subject was arrested for retail theft and issued citations with an appearance scheduled in the municipal court.
4. On September 22, 2017 at 11:44 pm, an officer on patrol observed two subjects in the parking lot of Riverpoint Village Shopping Center who appeared to be arguing. The officer stopped to investigate his observations and during the interview determined that one of the subjects appeared to be under the influence of alcohol. The officer investigated further since the subject was under 18 and determined that the subject was intoxicated. The subject was issued a citation for an underage alcohol violation and subsequently released to a parent. The juvenile will appear in the municipal court.
5. On September 23, 2017 at 12:37 am, an officer on patrol conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle for an equipment violation. During the course of the traffic stop, the officer determined that the driver had consumed alcohol prior to driving the vehicle and also had a revoked drivers license related to prior OWI offenses. Based on the officers' investigation, the driver was arrested for Operating While Impaired – 3rd offense, operating while revoked, and an outstanding arrest warrant from Ozaukee County Sheriff.
6. On September 23, 2017 at 12:59 am, an officer on patrol conducted a traffic stop in the 7300 block of North Port Washington Road for a speeding violation. During the traffic stop, the officer was advised that the owner of the vehicle had an outstanding arrest warrant with the Brown Deer Police Department. The passenger in the vehicle matched the description provided on the warrant and after being properly identified, was arrested for the warrant.

The subject was released short time later after they were able to satisfy the warrant requirements.

- 7. On September 26, 2017 at 5:15pm, a citizen came to the station to report a possible fraud. The citizen was contacted by telephone and told that they had outstanding taxes due to the IRS. The citizen purchased gift cards at Wal-Mart in the amount of \$2000 and proceeded to provide the caller with gift card information. A short time later the citizen believed this was fraudulent and returned to the Wal-Mart to cancel the cards. The cards had not been used and the citizen was able to recover their money.

***** Residents are reminded—DO NOT respond to any person calling you and requesting you to pay an outstanding debt with gift cards. The department has heard of this scam being used to pay the IRS, Sheriff Warrants for jury duty, and lawyer bills for kids in trouble in other states. *****

Did You Know?

September is National Pediculosis (Head Lice) Prevention Month. Pediculosis is an infestation on the head of eggs (nits), larvae or adult lice. Lice move by crawling; they cannot hop or fly. The lice feed on human blood, which can cause severe local itching. Head lice are not known to spread disease.

Pediculosis is spread most commonly by close person-to-person contact and less frequently by sharing clothing and belongings. To learn about prevention of head lice visit:

Treatment for head lice is recommended for persons diagnosed with an active infestation. All household members and other close contacts should be checked and treated if there is evidence of live lice. Many over the counter treatments exist which include pyrethrins and permethrin lotions. Head Lice Information for Schools

Both the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and the National Association of School Nurses (NASN) advocate that "no-nit" policies should be discontinued. "No-nit" policies that require a child to be free of nits before they can return to schools should be discontinued for the following reasons:

- Many nits are more than ¼ inch from the scalp. Such nits are usually not viable and very unlikely to hatch to become crawling lice, or may in fact be empty shells, also known as 'casings'.
- Nits are cemented to hair shafts and are very unlikely to be transferred successfully to other people.
- The burden of unnecessary absenteeism to the students, families and communities far outweighs the risks associated with head lice.
- Misdiagnosis of nits is very common during nit checks conducted by nonmedical personnel.
