Re: **Administrative Report for the Week Ending November 24, 2021**

ADMINISTRATION

1. Staff facilitated the Village Board public hearing and adoption for the 2022 Operating Budget.
2. Clerk Treasurer attended Municipal Treasurers Association of Wisconsin 2022 Spring Conference Committee meeting on Monday.
3. Clerk office staff met with new election inspector on Tuesday afternoon.
4. Milwaukee County delinquent taxes and Associated Appraisal Consultants assessor valuations were imported into the tax software this week to begin preparation of Real Estate and Personal Property tax bills.
5. Type A 2022 Notice of Spring Election was posted on the legal posting page of the website and on the 3 posting boards, as required; Type A notice was also sent to Milwaukee County Election Commission.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. DPW crews collected regular rubbish and yard waste Monday through Wednesday.
2. Crews continue to collect leaves working 10-hour days. Anticipated completion date of December 10, 2021.
3. Crews are working on a pruning request in the Forestry Department.
4. Crews began leaf clean-up on Village properties before winter.
5. The Lead Mechanic is working with a HVAC contractor regarding the heating system at Village Hall. Mechanics are still working on getting the new rubbish scooters and water utility truck ready to put in service.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

1. Officers found a vehicle stopped and running with the driver slumped over the wheel while on routine patrol. The officer was able to wake the driver and observed signs of impairment. The officer conducted field sobriety tests and subsequently arrested the driver for Operating While Under the Influence first offense. The driver will appear in municipal court.

2. Officers responded to Waukesha on a mutual aid request to provide assistance after the tragedy at the Christmas parade. Officers were on scene for approximately 14 hours while evidence was collected and the scene was processed. Fox Point officers provided assistance on the scene perimeter to prevent entry and scene contamination.
3. Officers provided assistance to Whitefish Bay police searching for a subject who fled from a traffic stop on foot.
4. Officers responded to McDonald's for a report of disorderly conduct after a customer and employee began arguing over an order. The customer refused to leave the drive-through lane and the verbal dispute escalated. Officers de-escalated the situation and provided mediation for the event.
5. Officers provided assistance on a perimeter for River Hills police after a vehicle pursuit and foot chase. The subject was apprehended by Glendale police through the use of their canine.
6. Officers responded to a disturbance call after an anonymous person reported hearing yelling and screaming in an apartment on a different floor. The officers identified the apartment and met with the occupants who were engaged in a verbal dispute. One of the subjects was leaving upon the officer's arrival, which resolved the matter.

NSHD Healthy Highlight 11/23/21: PANCREATIC CANCER MONTH

November is pancreatic cancer month.

The pancreas is responsible for making insulin and other hormones which help the body use or store energy from food.

According to DHS risk factors for pancreatic cancer include:

- **Smoking** is responsible for 20% to 30% of pancreatic cancer and the most avoidable risk factors,
- **Diabetes** increases likelihood of developing pancreatic cancer than those who are not diabetic,
- **Family history** can contribute to the increased risk of developing the disease, especially if a mother, father, sister, or brother has pancreatic cancer history,
- **Inflammation of the pancreas** is known as pancreatitis and can be painful. Having pancreatitis for a long period of time may increase pancreatic cancer risk.
- **Obesity** (those who are overweight or obese) are slightly more at risk, and maintaining healthy weight, eating well and exercising can help reduce risk.

It is important to note many people diagnosed with pancreatic cancer do not have these risk factors and many who do have known risk factors do not develop the disease.

Currently there are no established guidelines for preventing pancreatic cancer but avoiding risk factors may help decrease likelihood. Early detection is important!

COVID-19 INFORMATION

Cases of COVID-19 are on the rise in the North Shore, following the trend we are seeing across Wisconsin. In the last two weeks (11/9 to 11/22), the North Shore had 255 newly confirmed cases of COVID-19. In the two weeks prior (10/26 to 11/8), there were 132 newly confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the North Shore. This is a 93% increase in newly confirmed cases from one two-week period to the next.

With the holiday season upon us and cold temperatures moving us indoors, it is critical we stay diligent with precautionary measures, including vaccination, physical distancing, and masking. Everyone 18+ is now eligible for a COVID-19 booster and it is highly recommended you receive your booster as soon as you are able.

If you plan to gather for Thanksgiving and other upcoming holidays, follow these recommendations to help minimize your risk for getting or spreading COVID-19:

- Everyone who is eligible to get vaccinated should get any of the COVID-19 vaccines as soon as possible.
- Get tested and avoid gathering if you are sick, have symptoms of COVID-19, or were in close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- Wear a well-fitted mask over your nose and mouth if you are in a public indoor setting if you are not fully vaccinated.
 - Even if you are fully vaccinated, you should wear a mask indoors if you are in an area with high transmission. The North Shore is currently experiencing high transmission, so masks are recommended for everyone in indoor public settings.
- If you gather to celebrate, avoid crowding in indoor spaces.
- Gathering outdoors is always safer. Meet with friends and family for a post-meal walk outside.
- If you celebrate indoors, provide extra space between the chairs at the table.
- Consider setting up different areas in your home for activities to allow for physical distancing.

UPDATED MASK RECOMMENDATIONS: Masks are currently recommended in indoor public settings for everyone, regardless of vaccination status. The weekly update regarding COVID-19 community transmission level in the North Shore and Milwaukee County can be found on our [website](#).
