Re: **Administrative Report for the Week Ending June 24, 2022**

ADMINISTRATION

1. Board of Appeals Notices were posted and mail out to properties within 500 feet for the continuation of Case 2022-04, Case 2022-06, and Case 2022-07, by the clerk's office.
2. Ballots on file for the Partisan Primary election were mailed out Thursday and Friday by the clerk's office; the drop box has been removed. If hand delivering, please return your OWN ballot. The clerk's office **cannot accept hand-delivered ballots from anyone but the voter or the voter can return ballot by mail.**
3. WMCA President/Deputy Clerk Sara Bruckman and WMCA Conference Co-chair/Clerk Kelly Meyer traveled to Chula Vista this week Wednesday to tour the facility prior to Conference in August.
4. Staff picked up election supplies from the City of Milwaukee Warehouse for the Partisan Primary.
5. MTAW District 5 Co-Director Kelly Meyer held a District 5 education meeting on Thursday morning virtually via Zoom; staff attended.
6. Election Notices for the Partisan Primary were prepared and posted this week by the clerk's office.
7. Village Manager and Assistant Village Manager participated in ratings call with Moody's Investors Service.
8. Village Manager attended North Shore Managers meeting.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. The utility continues with valve turning and hydrant flushing as part of maintenance for the water system.
2. The utility repaired a water main break at 820 Green Tree Rd. A bell connection failed and caused the leak.
3. The utility is in the process of documenting where water laterals enter houses on Beach Drive.
4. Crews are working on rubbish and yard waste which are heavy from last week's wind storms.
5. Requests from the Forestry Department are being serviced.

6. DPW Crews assisted the water department on a water leak.
7. Crews continue to patch pot holes on village streets.
8. Preventative Maintenance was performed on the sanitary sewer lift stations on Beach drive.
9. Crews continued with seasonal grass mowing and park maintenance.
10. In the shop, Mechanics are working on preventative maintenance for the chipper truck along with lawn equipment.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

1. Officers responded to a report of fraud after a subject used a business check without permission. The officer continues to work with the business and bank to identify the subject.
2. Officers responded to a verbal argument that resulted in the arrest of one person for criminal damage to property after officers identified damage created by the subject during the argument. The case will be referred to the district attorney for review.
3. Administrative Assistant Kubiak attended the law enforcement administrative professionals conference. AA Kubiak was recognized as a candidate for administrative professional of the year during the conference.
4. Officers met with a resident in the station regarding possible fraud against a deceased family members name. The officer was able to quickly investigate and determine the financial information was legitimate and provided assistance to the resident.
5. Officers responded to McDonald's for a report of a disturbance inside the restaurant. A person in the drive-thru reported a verbal argument occurring while they picked-up their food. All parties involved in the verbal dispute left the scene prior to the officer's arrival.
6. Officers responded to a report of a missing person after an adult resident with age related dementia walked away from home. Officers were able to locate the person near their home and safely return them to family.
7. Officers assisted a deputy from the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office who stopped a stolen vehicle in the parking lot of Riverpoint Shopping Center.
8. Officers assisted River Hills police after a resident called and reported a possible person inside the home. The officers secured the home and searched for any possible intrusion. No criminal activity was found.

NORTH SHORE FIRE DEPARTMENT

1. Staff members and 911 Telecommunicators at Bayside Communications Center began going through training for Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) this week. This nationally recognized emergency medical dispatch protocol will be implemented in September 2022. The course is twenty-four hours.
2. New firefighter/EMT recruits started at their station/company assignments this week.
3. Initial interviews for hiring firefighter/EMTs for the Fall 2022 Recruit Class are scheduled for next week. The Fire Commission will interview final candidates in mid-July.

4. Chief Whitaker met with the President and Marketing Director of REV Group Ambulance Division, the parent company of Horton Ambulances, to discuss current challenges in the ambulance industry, specifically getting new chassis and electronic chips for their products. Both the President and Marketing Director are Whitefish Bay residents. REV Group is headquartered in Brookfield. The company, like all other ambulance manufacturers, is having challenges getting sufficient numbers of chassis from major vehicle manufacturers for ambulance production.
5. A fire in an attached garage caused damage to the garage and home on W. Pelican Lane in Brown Deer on Monday night.

NSHD Healthy Highlight 6/22/22: Preventing Childhood Lead Poisoning

Lead is a metal that is toxic to most living organisms⁽¹⁾.

In humans, there is no safe blood lead level (BLL), which means that even in small amounts, lead can be dangerous. Humans are mainly exposed to lead via paint, soil, and water. In children, lead exposure can lead to both physical and mental development issues as it effects many organs like brain, kidneys, and nervous system. This can lead to behavioral problems, learning disabilities, seizures, and very rarely death.

Lead Facts

- Lead exposure is a problem in all of Wisconsin's 72 counties.
- Children are most at-risk of lead exposure if they live in neighborhoods with older homes, lower housing values, and a higher proportion of rental properties.
- Even though rates of lead poisoning have declined over time in Wisconsin, there are dramatic differences for children of color, especially Black children who are poisoned at more than three times the rate of white children.*

Despite this previous fact, **ALL houses built prior to 1978 should be monitored and tested for lead.*

However, **LEAD POISONING IS 100% PREVENTABLE AND TREATABLE IF DETECTED EARLY.**

WHAT CAN WE DO:

Parents

- Ask your health care provider about lead testing - <https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/lead/test-your-child.htm>.
- Check and test your home for lead if you live in a home built before 1978 - <https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/lead/check-your-home.htm>.

Health Care Providers

- Ensure children ages 0-6 receive age-appropriate lead testes, especially children living in high-risk areas.

- Immediately connect parents of children with elevated BLL to services to prevent further exposure and for treatment.

Beach Monitoring

The Wisconsin DNR has a Beach Monitoring and Assessment program, which includes the testing of coastal public beaches and beaches at all of the Wisconsin State Parks. As part of this program, our department monitors the water quality at Atwater, Klode and Doctor's Parks throughout the summer by testing the water at least twice weekly for the presence of *E. coli* bacteria. Based on the test results, beaches are either considered:

- Green sign Open with no advisory,
- Yellow sign Open with an advisory indicating that caution should be used at the beach because of elevated bacteria levels, or
- Red sign: A beach may be closed due to highly elevated bacteria levels.
