**Re:** Administrative Report for the Week Ending July 8, 2022

### ADMINISTRATION

1. Village Manager met with resident concerning vacation rental/Airbnb code requirements.
2. Assistant Manager met with swim lesson instructors to discuss 2023 programming.
3. Partisan Primary election media and express vote ballots were delivered to the clerk's office by MCEC this week.
4. Treasurer/Finance staff met with Associated Bank for updates regarding LandNav software Conversion and the bi-annual meeting.
5. Village Board agenda and packet was assembled and prepared by staff for posting and delivery to the Village Board.
6. Treasurer worked with LandNav to fix concerns and issues with the new software.
7. Partisan Primary election ballots with requests continue to be mailed daily.
8. Partisan Primary election ballots continue to come into the office **with missing certification information**; clerk's staff continues to follow up with the voters to correct the discrepancies.
9. The clerk's office staff asks that voters read **all** instructions and double check the application/certification envelope prior to returning the ballots to the clerk's office; all highlighted areas should be completely filled out.
10. The clerk's office pre-tested the election equipment Friday, prior to the Partisan Primary.

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. DPW staff assisted with the July 4<sup>th</sup> parade setting up barricades and participating in the parade. After the parade, staff expressed concerns about children who were marching in the parade who were weaving in and around the DPW vehicles during the parade.
2. Staff received a notification from the DNR that FEMA has issued preliminary Flood Insurance Rate Maps for Fox Point. The updates expand the footprint of the 100-year floodplain – predominantly in the Indian Creek area – and appear to affect as many as 100 structures. More information will be presented at the Village Board meeting on Tuesday as well as a planned PIM on Wednesday, July 13.
3. Staff participated in a conference call with MSA regarding the Beach Drive water main replacement project on the north end of Beach Drive. We also asked them to provide a

- proposal to design the replacement of the water main along the southern stretch of Beach Drive and to make storm sewer improvements on Beach hill. The request was made after discussing the amount of bedding and revetment stone anticipated to be used on the project and determining that the road may suffer damages as the main haul route for the stone. As a result, we are anticipating that portions of Beach Drive will be repaved as part of the project and improving the infrastructure prior to paving will be prudent.
4. Staff received a notification from the DNR regarding the status of our permit application for the Beach Drive coastal resiliency project and reached out to one of the property owners (riparian owners) regarding the proposed project.
  5. Staff continued to work with internal staff as well as our proposed consultant regarding the water main relocation work anticipated to be completed on Port Washington Road as a result of the DOT's work in that area. The consultant's proposal as well as documents from the DOT will be presented to the Board next Tuesday for consideration.
  6. Work on the Wye Lane road reconstruction project will begin next week. Letters are being sent to the property owners on Wye Lane as well as along Port Washington Road and Bradley Road as the next phase of the construction will be the replacement of the water main on Port Washington Road.
  7. In the shop, Packer 13 was delivered this week. Decals and miscellaneous tasks will be performed before it is placed in service. Staff also received the chipper truck back (replaced the leaf springs), performed preventative maintenance and miscellaneous equipment maintenance activities.
  8. The Foreman has been very busy with the pool ensuring it continues to remain operational.
  9. DPW staff removed a large tree limb that fell across Fairchild Circle last week, worked on tree removals, performed cold patching and catch basin cleaning, cleaned garbage out of the Bridge Lane ravine, and coordinated pavement striping in the Village.
  10. Water utility staff provided information needed for the water main along the southern stretch of Beach Drive to the consultant, worked with the City of Glendale on the proposed improvements at the intersection of Bradley and Port Washington Roads, identified capital needs, and started removing brushy material from around fire hydrants.

### **POLICE DEPARTMENT**

1. Officers on patrol observed a suspicious vehicle that was believed to be related to recent entry to auto / stolen vehicle complaints and conducted a stop that resulted in the arrest of the driver for operating a vehicle without owner's consent. The driver had just stolen the vehicle from an apartment complex in the village and was driving with an accomplice vehicle searching for additional cars to steal. Both vehicles were stopped and the other vehicle fled when the officer observed a gun in the car. The investigation remains open as officers attempt to locate the other driver.
2. Officers conducted a traffic stop for a vehicle that was not displaying a registration plate and subsequently arrested the driver for an outstanding warrant. The driver was wanted by Marinette Police for a felony drug violation and was transported to the criminal justice facility for holding.

3. Officers responded to a complaint for damage to property after a resident found their mailbox had been damaged. The initial investigation indicates that the mailbox was destroyed by an unknown person using fireworks.
4. Officers responded to a report of a motor vehicle theft in progress when a resident observed two of their cars were missing from the garage. The resident advised that the cars were taken by unknown individuals without permission when the keys were left in the cars. Officers responding to the call observed one of the vehicles leaving the village at a very high rate of speed and attempted to locate the car. The investigating officers were able to recover one car later in the day and the other car remains at large.
5. Officers responded to a report of family trouble which resulted in one person being detained for mental health care under Wisconsin statute 51.15. The subject was transported to the mental health facility by the officer.
6. Officers participated in the municipal parade on July 4th, as well as providing parade security. After the parade, officers met with residents at the Longacre pavilion.
7. Sergeant Arendt conducted a Drug Recognition Expert evaluation on a driver who was arrested after a motor vehicle accident in Whitefish Bay.
8. Officers responded for a report of family trouble at Doctor's Park. The incident occurred in Bayside and was investigated by their agency and Milwaukee County Sheriff's deputies. While at the park, Fox Point officers were notified of a garbage can fire and extinguished the fire.

#### **NSHD Healthy Highlight 7/06/22: Tobacco is Changing Vaping and E-Cigarettes**

Vaping and E-Cigarettes are a health risk for people of all ages; however, youth are especially vulnerable to use of electronic tobacco products.

According to [Wisconsin Department of Health Services](#): *"In Wisconsin, 11 percent of middle schoolers have tried electronic tobacco products, and 4 percent of middle schoolers are current users. Those numbers jump by the time kids reach high school. Today, 32 percent of high schoolers have tried e-cigarettes, and 20 percent consider themselves current users."*

Some of the [health risks associated with electronic tobacco products](#) include:

- Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, a potent chemical compound that makes cigarettes, chew, and other tobacco products highly addictive.
- The industry's most popular e-cigarette pod contains as much nicotine as 20 cigarettes.
- E-liquids can contain heavy metals (nickel, tin, lead).
- Diacetyl, a flavoring found in many e-liquids, has been linked to lung disease.

[Sweet and trendy flavors contribute to e-cigarette popularity among youth](#): *"80 percent of young e-cigarette users said they used e-cigarettes "because they come in flavors I like," and 95 percent of Wisconsin middle schoolers say they wouldn't use an unflavored product."*

*Often e-cigarettes look like common items found in daily life and may be overlooked.*

Our department monitors the water quality at Atwater, Klode and Doctor's Parks throughout the summer by testing the water at least twice weekly for the presence of *E. coli* bacteria. Based on test results, beaches are considered:

- Green: Open with no advisory,
- Yellow: Open with an advisory indicating caution should be used at the beach because of elevated bacteria levels, or
- Red: Beach may be closed due to highly elevated bacteria levels.
