Re: **Administrative Report for the Week Ending July 22, 2022**

ADMINISTRATION

1. Manager and Assistant Manager held mid-year insurance review with representatives from R&R Insurance.
2. Assistant Manager met with representatives of the Fox Point Foundation regarding their September 17 Village Picnic event.
3. Assistant Manager held project kickoff meeting for Village website redesign on July 20.
Please submit any high-definition pictures of scenic Village life that would be appropriate for the website to the Assistant Manager by August 5.
4. Assistant Manager attended WCMA Region 7 summer meeting on July 21.
5. Village clerk's office is preparing for in-person absentee voting, beginning on Tuesday, July 26, 2022 and running through August 5, 2022; no appointments are necessary. Please check the village website or MyVote Wisconsin for available hours.
6. Clerk's office SVDs visited Azura for registration and voting on Tuesday.
7. Deadline for online and postmarked mailed registration was on Wednesday; voters must register in person in the clerk's office for late registration or at the poll location on election day.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. Staff performed normal rubbish and yard waste collections, grass mowing and park maintenance, and gravel shouldering on Village streets.
2. Public Works was paged in on Saturday 7/15/22 for a tree limb across the road in the 7600 block of Regent Road.
3. Forestry Department is working on a request for removal.
4. Staff performed asphalt repair work around manholes.
5. Ongoing maintenance and repair work was done at the pool. The chlorine line in the mechanical pit required repairs on 7/21/22 that forced the pool to close for the day.
6. Mechanics performed Preventative Maintenance on equipment.
7. The Water Utility set up a water meter on a fire hydrant at Bradley and Port Washington Road for RJ Underground for directional drilling the new water main.
8. DPW Staff continue to do hydrant flushing and valve turning on the west side of the Village.

9. American Sewer started digging boring pits on Port Washington Road for RJ Underground on Monday July 18th.
10. American Sewer had pipe and other parts delivered to Wye Lane. They are stacked at the intersection of Lake Drive and Wye Lane.
11. American Sewer is staging equipment at the dead end of Bradley Road by the freeway for the work on Port Washington Road.
12. 7950 Port Washington Road called with questions about the water being turned off for the connection of the new water main. Their main concern is they have a pediatrics department in the building and are concerned with the timing of the shutdown.
13. Staff has not received further communication about the Port Washington Road and Bradley Road crossing from We Energies.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

1. Officers responded to a report of dog bite / dog attack when a resident had their dog bitten by another dog. The dog was bitten while being walked by the resident and another dog left their yard. The owner of the attacking dog was issued a citation and the matter was referred to the North Shore Health Department for review.
2. Officers responded to a report of suspicious activity after a contractor reported seeing a male subject break the window of a home and flee the area. The officers investigated the matter, interviewed the reporting person, and searched the area for the suspect. The officer observed a window that was shattered, but no other evidence that entry was attempted. The matter remains under investigation.
3. Officers responded to a report of disorderly conduct after a contractor and former employer engaged in a verbal dispute regarding equipment. The dispute escalated at one point where the former employer pushed the contractor and then left the area. The subject was located by officers and arrested for simple battery. The subject will appear in municipal court.
4. Officers responded to a report of retail theft at Walgreens after a customer observed a male subject wearing a ski mask enter the store with a companion. The customer called 911 due to the suspicious nature of the behavior. The subjects were in the store less than 2 minutes and fled on foot with items prior to officers' arrival. The investigation remains open as officers attempt to identify the suspects.
5. Officers responded to a report of a theft after a resident noted the catalytic converter had been removed from their car without permission. The car had been parked for approximately one week and the part was removed at some time during that week.
6. Staff completed maintenance on the police station, including repainting lines in the parking lot.
7. Officers responded to assist Bayside police with a report of a battery and subjects engaged in drug use at a residence. Officers provided ancillary support and did not have contact with involved parties.
8. Officer Bastress attended the Wisconsin DARE conference to obtain program updates and training.

NORTH SHORE FIRE DEPARTMENT

- A hazardous materials incident resulted in the evacuation of a 150-unit apartment building in Brown Deer on July 15. A fire alarm alerted occupants and the fire department to a problem with the building's HVAC System that needed to be mitigated by the Milwaukee Fire Department Regional Hazardous Materials Team. Crews were on scene for approximately 3 hours.
- W. Brown Deer Rd is closed at the railroad tracks in the Village of Brown Deer both east and westbound for railroad repairs in conjunction with the Wisconsin DOT. Station 81 is using alternate routes to calls west of the railroad tracks. [Fox 6 provided news coverage of the closure and the impact on fire and EMS responses.](#)
- The Department assisted the Milwaukee Fire Department at a 2-Alarm Fire at the former Northridge Mall on Tuesday July 19. Crews were on scene for several hours.

In 2020, the U.S. had one death by suicide every 11 minutes. Suicide is a leading cause of death for people aged 10-34 years. You are not alone.

988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline provides help to individuals in emotional distress, or mental health, and/or substance abuse crises or those helping a loved one, through a national network of 200 crisis centers.

Risk factors are attributes that make it more likely a person considers, attempts, or dies by suicide.

- Mental disorders, particularly mood disorders, schizophrenia, anxiety disorders, and certain personality disorders
- Alcohol and other substance use disorders
- Hopelessness
- Impulsive and/or aggressive tendencies
- History of trauma or abuse
- Major physical illnesses
- Previous suicide attempt(s)
- Family history of suicide
- Job or economic loss
- Loss of relationship(s)
- Easy access to lethal means
- Local clusters of suicide
- Lack of social support and sense of isolation
- Stigma associated with asking for help
- Lack of healthcare, especially mental health and substance abuse treatment

- Cultural and religious beliefs, such as the belief that suicide is a noble resolution of a personal dilemma
- Exposure to others who have died by suicide (in real life or via the media and Internet)

988 will be able to accept calls, texts, or chats.

Warning signs may help determine if a person is at risk for suicide, especially if the behavior is new, has increased, or seems related to a painful event, loss, or change. If you or someone you know exhibits any of these, seek help.

- Talking about wanting to die or to kill themselves
- Looking for a way to kill themselves, like searching online or buying a gun
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain
- Talking about being a burden to others
- Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs
- Acting anxious or agitated, behaving recklessly
- Sleeping too little or too much
- Withdrawing or isolating themselves
- Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge
- Extreme mood swings
